MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL – Mr. P.Veenendaal FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT (based on Galatians 5)

Because I come from a farming background and have lived in a time when families depended on large vegetable gardens, it is not a surprise to anyone that I enjoy growing things and watching them grow from seeds to mature plants which bear fruit. Even though farm life is far in my past, I still try to fill up every corner of my very small yard with plants. I still plant some bean seeds and tomato plants, but a large vegetable garden is no longer the main focus of my gardening. That focus has now become shrubs and flowers. But regardless of the focus and whether the fruit is beans or marigolds, the work of a true gardener is never done. There is always something that needs some TLC, needs to be moved or replaced or needs to be added. There is so much more that I would like to plant. I find it difficult to walk through a garden center or greenhouse and leave without buying another new plant of some kind.

Sometimes when you see someone else's garden, you can get the idea that it grows, matures, and bears fruit all by itself. How hard can it be to pick up those seeds or bedding plants, drop them in the soil and wait for the fruit or flowers to appear? And the results are always fantastic, especially at someone else's place. Every time I see it, it looks perfect and beautiful.

Don't be fooled by what looks so simple and perfect. Before you have been invited to see the beautiful garden or before you could pick those wonderful green beans or new potatoes, many

hours of work and sweat have gone into making it what it is. The seedlings need to be protected from late frosts and strong winds. They need regular watering and weeding. When insects attack them, these need to be eliminated. Only when all this is done diligently, can you expect a harvest of fruits and vegetables and flowers.

So it is with the Fruit of the Spirit. The Holy Spirit is the Gardener who works in your heart. He leads you and helps you grow to be mature Christians, who desire to live by the Spirit – not to indulge the sinful nature. It does not happen all by itself! The Holy Spirit is busy working that in you every day again. And what is the result for those in whom He works? They want to serve others in love.

And if you live by the Spirit and are filled with love for your neighbours, there will be no room for all those other nasty things like immorality, impurity, hatred, jealousy, etc. Then the Fruit of the Spirit – love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control will fill your heart and your actions.

Others around you may marvel at how this may look so effortless in your life. They may not realize or be able to acknowledge the work of the Holy Spirit that has gone on for so long. But you know that this has not happened by itself. It hasn't even happened because of the efforts you have made. This fruit can live in you only if you desire to hear and obey God's Word.



As we do our work this year as students and staff at Immanuel Christian School, we will pay attention to this fruit of the Spirit as found in Galatians 5. My prayer is that the Spirit may work mightily in each one of us so that our sinful natures with their passions and desires may be

weeded out of our lives that we may become more and more in step with the Spirit as followers of Christ and show that in all we are busy with in this new school year. *(This message can also be found in the Secondary Student Handbook)*

4. **STUDENTS:** We are accustomed to welcoming new students, and we do that joyfully. We are not always so happy when students leave our school. We will be missing the Nienhuis children as they moved to Ontario. Also, Anne-Marie Versteeg has moved to Ontario and Aaron Kanis and Iain Maclaren will be attending other schools in the area.

These students will be at school on Mondays and Wednesdays during the first semester and on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays after the Christmas break.

5. High school students, when you received copies of your new timetable, you probably noticed a change in the daily schedule. We have organized your days so that you will have 4 70-minute periods every day and 1 35-minute period for Reformed Studies every day. Your breaks will be a little bit longer so please, no more excuses for being late for class.
6. **COMMUNICATION:** A very important aspect of having our school running well is communication between school and home. In the first place, if you have questions or concerns about anything, please talk to the person(s) involved. As in the past, we will try to keep parents and students informed about events and expectations via the **Messenger**. This weekly publication for supporters of Immanuel Christian School is distributed on Fridays via the youngest student in the families and via Church mailboxes for supporters who don't have children at school. If you know of anyone who is not receiving a Messenger, and should be, please contact the school office and let us know. Mr. James Dykstra has volunteered to re-organize and maintain our school website so check it out for various documents and information you may need. The weekly **Messenger** will be posted there as well. Just check www.immanuelchristian.ca
7. **STUDENT AND PARENT HANDBOOKS:** Students in Grades 7-12 will receive their agendas (including handbooks) on the first day of school. I would like to encourage **students and parents** to read through the handbook included in there. It is updated every year so there are some changes that are important for you to know. We will highlight those changes for the students in a high school assembly on the first day of school right after our lunch break. Note that attendance is mandatory, whether students have a class or a spare during that time. Parents, if you would like your own copy of the Secondary Student Handbook or the Elementary Parents' handbook, just contact the ICS office.

8. **TEACHING PERMITS:** As usual, we have applied for limited teaching permits for two staff members. We do not anticipate any problems in this regard.
9. **IA / HOME EC. CLASSES** will be on Day 1 in the morning in the first semester. That means the first classes will be on Wednesday, September 15. Grade 6 will have Plastics; Grade 7 will have Graphics and Grade 8 will be in Foods for the first semester. Thanks to those parents who have made driving schedules in past years. We would like to encourage someone to take this task on for each of Grade 6, 7 and 8. When completed, please provide a copy to the school office.
10. **SCHOOL PICTURES** will be taken on **October 13** starting at 9 AM. Kindergarten students have school on that day.
11. **STUDENT INSURANCE FORMS:** from Reliable Life are available at the school. Let us know if you would like one.
12. **REMINDERS FOR STUDENTS:**
 1. Elementary and secondary classes all begin at 8:40. High school students should take note of the following changes to the high school schedule times: 1st class runs from 8:40 – 10:00 (which includes devotions); 2nd class – 10:05 – 11:15; 3rd class (which is always Reformed Studies) 11:30 – 12:05; Lunch time 12:05 – 12:55; 4th class 1:00 – 2:10 and last class 2:20 – 3:30.
 2. If you took your Bible and/or Book of Praise home for the summer, remember to bring them back on the first day of school. Take a quick look on your desks and bookshelves at home to see if they contain any other **books** that belong to the school and return them as soon as possible.
 3. You have all received a highschool timetable in your church mailslots recently. More copies will be available on the first day of school. Several small revisions have been made since you received your copy. If you encounter any conflicts or need to make some course changes, please report that to the office staff.
 4. Grade 9-12 students may have off-property privileges if approved by their parents. On the first day of school, all of these students will receive special forms that need to be completed and signed by a parent before they are returned to the office. No privileges will be granted if the forms have not been returned. IA and Home Ec. students will receive permission forms concerning their transportation to and from their classes.
 5. Students who have permission and leave school property during the school day, must sign out at the office and then sign in again when they return. It is important that we know at any time which students are in the school. This is especially important in case of emergencies at school.
 6. All Grade 7-12 students are required to keep their lockers locked. Homeroom teachers will collect everyone's lock registration number and combination for office records. If a student uses a lock with a key, one key must be turned in to be kept in the main office. This policy is in place to, as much as possible, avoid complaints about missing items and also to avoid the temptations to take things that belong to someone else. Students, please keep your lock combinations confidential.
 7. Aside from lunches, students are allowed only water to drink in the classrooms. Liquids are often spilled and water makes the least mess. Also sweet drink is not necessarily good for the

students. Especially for elementary students, it would be helpful if their water bottles had only small openings or flip-tops.

8. It may seem a little early to mention this one now, but I've already seen stores stocked up with Christmas items, so it is not so far-fetched. Last year the school acquired a number of "crazy carpet" sleds for students to use on the snowhills when the snow flies. These are the only sleds we wish to see used at school. We have no safe place to store the great variety of sleds that has come to school in the past, so please do not allow your children to bring any of these from home.

- 13. REMINDERS FOR PARENTS:**
1. Please have your children at school on time. Every class has devotions first thing in the morning and it is very disruptive to have students coming into the classroom in the middle of a Bible story, a song, or a prayer. If your children need to be absent from school, do not forget to phone or send a note with a sibling. It will save us phoning home to try to find out where they are.
 2. Outside supervision starts at 8:20 AM. If you send your children to school before that, they will be outside unsupervised. On Monday mornings we have staff devotions at 8:00. Try to keep this in mind if you need to phone the school.
 3. Remind your children to behave responsibly on the parking lot. Drivers, be careful as well. It is a busy area, especially after 3:30 and we don't want mishaps. We expect to have our student patrols on the job again this year. They have rules to enforce, so please give them your full cooperation.
 4. According to our ICS Field Trip Policy, all parents (and other adults) who participate in volunteer driving (including Home Ec. And IA drivers) "*All drivers must have a valid driver's license and current registration. A current copy of each should be provided to the office by those drivers participating in off-site activities.*" We are willing to make copies of your documents at the school, so please stop by the office as soon as you can. Remember that these documents need to be current.
 5. If any of you have moved recently, have you remembered to make us aware of your new mailing address and / or phone number? If not, please do so as soon as possible.
- 14. ALLERGY CONCERNS:**
1. Some staff members as well as a number of students are allergic to strong scents. Please do not wear / use shampoos, deodorants, aftershave lotions, or perfumes which are scented so that everyone can work in our school safely. If you need help in choosing safe products, contact the school office and we will provide you with a list. This counts for all staff members, students, parents and other guests who come into our school building.
 2. As well as being scent-free, our school must continue to be nut-free. This includes avoiding foods which "*may contain traces of nuts*" or "*may have come into contact with nuts during the manufacturing process.*" If you need help in identifying safe food items for lunches or snacks, contact the school office.
- 15. VISITORS AND GUESTS:** All visitors to ICS will be required to sign in at the office when they enter the building and sign out when they leave. We will have a clipboard on the counter for you to write your name and the times at which you come and leave again. Those who attend school programs and assemblies and those whom we expect regularly (librarians and volunteer cleaners) are exempt from this. We have implemented this so we know who is coming into our school. It is not meant to discourage visitors but is for security reasons. It is a common

practice in most schools. If you are bringing guests into the school, please remind them of the items mentioned in item #13 above.

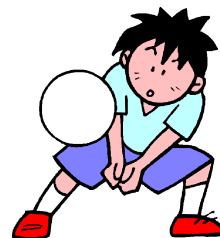

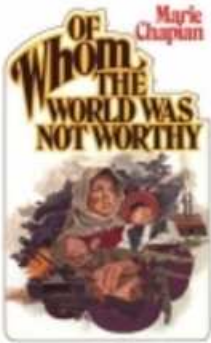
